Dear FCJ College community,

Last week we farewelled our Graduating class of 2024. It was a wonderful evening that commenced with a Valedictory Mass in St Joseph's Church and then followed by a lovely dinner at the Glasshouse. Below is a copy of my final address to the graduates of 2024, inspired by the words of our dear Sr Rosemary Crowe.

Good evening families, friends, staff and especially graduates of FCJ College 2024.

Today is a momentous occasion, a day filled with celebration, pride, and perhaps, just a touch of uncertainty. It is a day to honour your hard work, your growth, and the journey that has led you here. As I stand before you, it's hard not to think back (many years) to when I had just graduated high school and I want to share a little piece of it with you.

When I was five years old, I wanted to be a fireman. I wanted to drive the trucks, hit the sirens and run into the burning buildings. But by the time I finished high school, my dreams had shifted. I was going to be a diplomat, working for the United Nations, solving global conflicts, and making a difference on the world stage. But here I am today. Not a fireman. Not a diplomat. Instead, a teacher, a principal, here at a FCJ College, standing before you fine people as you commence the next chapter.

Across my life, and across yours, you will be asked this question—often, maybe too often: "What do you want to do when you grow up?" Or perhaps, "What are you doing next?" We hear these questions so frequently. When you finish school, when you finish university, when you finish your job, when you finish this chapter—what will you do next?

No doubt you have heard these questions, you may have been asked them this evening even. And while these questions are natural, they also have a way of overwhelming us, don't they? The constant wondering about what's next can be stressful. It can lead to worry, to comparisons, to doubts about whether you're on the "right" path. And so, this evening, I want to offer you a different perspective. I want to challenge you, as you stand at this important crossroads, to consider not answering those questions for a moment.

Instead of constantly worrying about what's next, I want you to think about blooming where you are planted.

I first heard this phrase when I was about your age, and to be honest, I didn't listen to it. I didn't want to bloom where I was planted. I wanted to be thrown somewhere else. I wanted to be someone else. I wanted to rush ahead to the next phase of life, the next adventure, the next achievement. But recently, I was reminded of this phrase again at the funeral Sr Rosemary, an FCJ sister with a strong connection to St Joseph's, FCJ and the Benalla region and her words have stayed with me.

She had shared about how her greatest joy came from being able to bloom where she was planted—how she found purpose, peace, and fulfillment in living fully in the present, not in rushing ahead to the next thing, but by embracing where she was, with all of its challenges, its joys, and its opportunities for growth.

So, what does this mean for you today, graduates? It means that you don't have to have everything figured out. You don't have to know exactly what your future will look like or where life will take you. Life is a journey, and sometimes, the most important thing is to simply live each step of that journey with intention, with purpose, and with faith.

Think about it: You are all entering a world filled with possibilities. But you will also face challenges. You will encounter moments of doubt. There will be times when you wonder if you're on the right path, or if you should be doing something else, something bigger, something more important and impressive. In those moments, remember that you don't have to be anywhere else to be of value. You don't have to wait for the "next" thing to make a difference.

You can bloom right where you are, in the midst of your circumstances, and be exactly who God has called you to be, right now.

So, graduates, as you move forward, I encourage you to take a deep breath and trust that the next step will come when it is meant to come. Right now, in this moment, bloom where you are planted. Make the most of the gifts you've been given—your talents, your faith, your kindness, your love. Let these things shape the world around you, even if it doesn't feel like you're changing the world all at once. You are planting seeds. You are making an impact. And before you know it, you'll look around and see how you've grown.

Congratulations, Class of 2024, I am so proud of each of you. Go forth with faith, with hope, and with the courage and confidence that wherever you are, you can bloom.

OES UNIT 2 SURF TRIP TO ANGLESEA







The Unit 2 Outdoor Education class recently embarked on an exciting three-day trip to Anglesea, along the iconic Great Ocean Road. Sixteen eager students and three staff members made the most of the coastal environment, testing their skills, exploring nature, and deepening their connection with the outdoors in a series of memorable activities.

Day one began with overcast skies and cool temperatures, but that didn't dampen the group's enthusiasm. In the afternoon, students headed down to Anglesea Beach for their first surf lesson. Despite the chilly weather, everyone was keen to get out on the water, and surf instructors quickly had the group paddling and learning the basics of riding the waves. The challenge of balancing on the board and catching their first wave made for an exciting experience, with many students showing impressive determination. The instructors emphasized safety, ocean awareness, and respect for the environment, ensuring that everyone learned valuable skills in a fun and safe setting.

Day two kicked off with another session of surfing, this time in the morning. With overcast skies still lingering, the students were eager to refine their skills from the previous day. Under the guidance of the surf instructors, many students managed to improve their technique, catching more waves and feeling more confident in the water. For those who had been a little unsure the day before, it was clear that practice was paying off.

After the morning surf session, the group took to the Great Ocean Road to enjoy lunch in the nearby town of Lorne. The afternoon was spent exploring the lush Great Otway National Park on a bushwalk. Surrounded by towering trees and dense fern gullies, students were able to connect with nature and learn more about the local ecosystems. Along the way, they learned about sustainability practices, the importance of conservation, and the diverse wildlife that calls the park home.

On the final day of the trip, the students visited the iconic Split Point Lighthouse. Standing on the rugged cliffs with sweeping views of the coastline, the lighthouse offered a chance to learn about the area's maritime history and its role in guiding ships safely along the coast as well as the human impact on this fragile environment. The group had time to take in the breathtaking scenery before heading to the famous Torquay outlet stores. Here, the students were able to relax and explore the local shops, rounding off the trip with a bit of retail therapy.

By the end of the three days, the students had gained valuable skills, made lasting memories, and forged stronger connections with both the natural world and each other. Whether it was riding the waves or hiking through ancient forests, every experience offered lessons in resilience, teamwork, and environmental stewardship.



















Youth Outreach Recovery Support (YORS)

Youth Outreach Recovery Support (YORS) is a Mental Health Community Support Service (MHCSS) for young people aged 16-25 years who are experiencing mental health symptoms or significant psychological distress, it will be delivered by existing Youth Residential Recovery (YRR) service providers across Victoria.

YORS is funded by the Department of Health to provide young people with short to medium term flexible outreach wellbeing support to help them to better manage their mental health, develop practical life skills for independent living and self-care, engage in community life, access other health and social support services they need, and make the journey towards recovery and the life they want

YORS is for young people aged 16-25 years in Victoria, who are experiencing mental health sympto or significant psychological distress.

It will complement, but not duplicate, case management supports the young person may be receiving from other service providers (e.g. area mental health services, youth justice, out of home care and homelessness providers) by providing a psychosocial therapeutic response tailored to the needs of the young person. This includes providing young people with some access to the YRR group progran and activities on a day basis. This support can also be provided before or after a YRR bed-based.

How do you refer to YORS?

Young people can self-refer to YORS. With the young person's consent, referrals can also be made by family members or carers, schools, youth services, GPs, private and public mental health clinicians, headspace, Prevention and Recovery Care Services (PARCS), as well as health and social support services such as those related to: homelessness, justice, out of home care, and substance use or
